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

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Victorian High Country Trip (Hut Run) 2021

Nov 19th – Nov 22nd 2021

(Trip Report By Marc Seow)

Duration: 4 Days

Day 1 – Friday, 19th November 2021

Weather forecast was not ideal and our group packed for wet and cold weather. It was overcast at times at our meeting point but the overall energy was high and the eager ones arrived early. All club paperwork filled up and covid requirements checked off by group leaders. Trevor's group was late and there was discussions on a fine and him buying lunch but it all soon dissipated once we set off.



Over the radio, car 8 – Daniel was saying that his Navara was making some weird noises and did not seem to go away. Convoy pulled off the freeway into a gas station to assess Daniel's vehicle. Collectively, it was talked through and the car was in no condition to continue up the High Country. Robert and Renae made a decision to stay with Daniel and not proceed.

Down to a 6 car convoy, we made our way to Mansfield. Pulled off to a gas station for a toilet break, last top up of gas, grab a spot of lunch, quick chat with the group and off to King's Hut Campgrounds. While pulling the caravan, Trip Leaders Michael and Susan's Ranger had transmission heating issues. They just picked up their car a day earlier after being at the repair shop for a few weeks after their Portland Sand Dunes trip. On the way to the campsite, up the hills, the tranny was overheating a bit and we had to pull over to cool it down or risk potential breakdown.



It was 271km from 7/11 MacDonald's Service Station at the Western Ring Road and just under 4hrs drive time to reach our campsite destination. We were very fortunate as there was only 1 other group at the South side of the camp site and our group took up the other side. Plenty of space to set up camp.

Michael and Susan – Trev and Wassana had their caravans / campers with them and their setup was very fast. Gavin had his tent on top of his rig so he could not set up camp as the plan was to head up to Craigs hut to see the Sunset. For the rest of us mere mortals, we had tents, albeit the fast 30 sec / 3 min set up ones. It certainly did not take that fast for us and the camping veterans soon came to the rescue to help the noobs (Marc).

Once all happy with the setup, a quick briefing by the trip leaders (mainly Susan), we were off to Craig's hut to see the sunset. Our journey up took us through King Basin Road, Speculation Road, Circuit Road, Monument Track, Clear Hills Track and into Craig's Hut carpark. The Monument Track is a short cut from Bindaree / Circuit Road up to Craig's Hut. Plenty of steep hills, undulations, ruts, and curves. A clear favorite.

There was a small damper on this journey as overheating issues continued to plague the Ranger and they had to pull over on the side of one of the tracks to allow it to cool down. The situation was heating up at this point and temperature at the Byers corner was escalating at an alarming rate. Trevor, sensed this and raced back down the hill to pick up Michael and Susan and bring them up to Craig's hut. The magnificent views, cool temperature, and serenity all seemed to level things out.



We headed back down the hill, picked up Michael's car which by this time cooled down and headed back to basecamp for our supper. On the menu was, Chicken wraps, sandwiches, crisps, your usual camping feed if you will. But not for Conrad De Souza, - He whips up a huge tomahawk steak with lobster tail, mash and snow peas.



Day 2 – Saturday, 20th November 2021

We had bits of rain pass through overnight and woke up to a fresh crisp morning. We had our days briefing by Susan at 0830hrs and we set off soon after. 1st stop was Bindaree Falls for a small hike through some vegetation to catch the beautiful waterfalls. Afterwhich we were full on the "Hut Run" Pikes Hut – Flat Hut – Bluff Hut – Lovicks Hut and Upper Jamieson hut.

The entire drive was simply awesome and never a dull moment. It was filled with uphill/downhill sections, ruts, overhanging trees, cut trees in the middle of the track which we could barely squeeze through, river crossings, river crossings and more river crossings.

We covered and travelled along King Basin Road, Speculation Road, Circuit Road, Bindaree Road, Upper Howqua Road, Sixteen Mile Jeep Road, 16 Mile Jeep Track, Bluff Link Road, Bluff Track, Cairn Creek Track, Brocks Road, Upper Jamieson Hut Track.

The tracks started to get busy by mid-day and we ran into a few groups and clubs exploring the High Country. There was even an all girl 4WD club that passed us and I was delighfully waving at them. It was a stark contrast the day before as there was hardly anybody around.

Trevor was behind me and saw that I was pumping the brakes heaps of times downhill before heading towards the river crossing. It was here that I learnt how to do use manual gear shift / engine brake. The best way to learn is by doing and I learnt pretty quick from Trev's wealth of experience.

We could not have asked for better weather, the sun was shining, tracks were dry and very manageable. The Ranger did not have further heating issues as was running good.


The stand outs of the day was Conrad's disco which has all the tech you can think off including radar cruise control at low range with lane assist and lane departure warning. Phil's Jimny was also a star as it was so nimble and quick. In addition, people were coming up to him saying he had a nice Jimny and its not seen very often. It was a big day, we did approx 6hrs of driving, averaged about 40 km/h, in low range for the most part.

We stopped a few times on the way back to load up on firewood. Made our way back to basecamp and came across a group with 20 odd hounds near our campsite. They were hunting for deer.

There was also a group of young hikers who had a bus and a trailer trying to do an Austin Powers 27 point turn along a narrow track. Trevor passed them and asked if they were having a good time. He got no response.

Back at camp, we sorted dinner and Chef Conrad had Chicken Paella and Rack of Lamb which was a hit around the campfire. Day 2 done.





Day 3 – Sunday, 21st November 2021

The Sun was up strong and it got hot pretty fast. Some group members were heading back today and started taking down the tents and loading up their cars. We had our briefing at 0845hrs and set off at 0900hrs.

We headed off to Howqua Gap Hut and made our way to Mount Buller. We have been at 20ish psi for tires pretty much the whole time in the High Country and when we hit the bitumen we were advised not to drive too fast or take drastic turns. We drove pretty much as high as we could up Mount Buller and had a sensational 360 view. Its very different being up there with no snow and there was hardly anyone there. Almost like a ghost town.

Conrad and Marc aired up, said their goodbyes to the rest of the group, and left for Werribee. The rest of the group headed off to Razorback Hut. Afterwhich, Trevor's group picked up their camper at basecamp and headed back to Melbourne while the rest ending up at Lake Cobbler and they did one more night at basecamp before heading back.

This was our first camping trip with the club and a big thank you to Michael and Susan Byers for organizing, charting, and planning. Thanks to Trevor for his invaluable advice. Gavin and Phill, it was a pleasure camping with you guys. It was unfortunate that Robert, Renae, their kids and Daniel could not complete the journey with us.

 - c. Car wading depth
 - d. Key engine elements, what to look out for and check
 - Final theory paperwork

- a. Question and answer session
- b. Go through answers



The 1st hurdle was water crossing or mud crossing.

As the water was murky, we could not see how deep it goes and if there are any bigger holes underneath. Head instructor Fred discussed options and Brad volunteered to grab a stick and started poking around the water to check depth level. Once getting the all clear, the first vehicle passed through and the rest followed behind picking the correct lines.





After the mud crossing it was up a steep hill which was very intimating especially for the 1st time off roaders. All the participants had the instructors with them to guide them through any reservations they might have had negotiating the off road terrain.



Afterwhich, it was all driving in the figure 8 training track. Uphill, downhill, sidehill, uphill sidehill, downhill sidehill, combination of all. This whole process was to get the student used to the car and what it is capable of. Many thought while on the sidehill portion, the car would be on the tipping point and on the verge of rolling over. Going through the course, this made them aware of the car's capabilities.



It was a great fun filled day with plenty of information to soak in and practical practice. Congratulations to all who participated and earned their 4WD course completion "Degree". Special thanks to Club President Rowan Burton who graced us with his presence and imparted very useful and practical lessons to follow. To our Glorious Chief Instructor, Fred Schenck, thank you for your valuable insights, stories, knowledge and years of experience with 4 wheel driving and training drivers.



How to run a Club Trip

It's easy to run your own trip, here are the steps to running a great club trip.

- Contact the Trip Co-Ordinator tripcoordinator@werribee4wdclub.com.au
- The Trip Co-Ordinator will forward on required Trip register etc via email Print out prior to the trip
- Create an Event on Facebook
 - a. Go to Facebook Member's page
 - **b.** Click Events,
 - c. Click + in top right-hand side,
 - d. In person Then add date & times,
 - e. Location could be the meeting place, Add description, This should be amount of spots available, Required recovery gear, Required training level or Easy, Medium, hard. Meeting place and time to meet. (Remember to make your meeting time 20 30 minutes earlier than departure time to allow filling out Trip Register and group chat about the trip.
 - f. Invite all members.
 - g. Click Create Event.
 - h. Member's will reply with name and car number e.g.: Trev & Wassana Car #1,
 - i. Next car will indicate Name & Name Car #2 and so on.
 - **j.** Once the trip is full members will reply Reserve Name & Name Car #1 the reserve car will then slot in if there is a cancellation.

Its recommended to limit the number of Cars to 10, if it becomes popular you can find another trip leader to run two groups.

On the Day

Items for the pre-trip discussion.

- Introduction of Trip leader, Tail End Charlie, and general introduction of members on the day
- Allocate a member to run the trip report (usually whoever arrives late or first to get a "fine")
- Convoy Procedures.
- It's generally worth putting experienced members between inexperienced members and introduce new members.
- On departure get each car to do a radio check (UHF channel 27), nothing worse than losing someone because they can't hear instructions or direction.

After the trip

- Follow up your trip with a fun post on the Members Facebook page.
- Create a photo album on the Members page for the event and encourage members from the trip to share pictures.
- Submit trip report to the Trip Co-Ordinator.

Convoy Procedure

- 1. Each convoy will contain a Trip Leader who will lead the convoy and coordinate the trips activities for the group. The Trip Leader is to brief the convoy members at the commencement of the trip on the day's events.
- 2. The Trip Leader will remind all drivers of the Convoy Procedures before the trips moves off.
- **3.** The Trip Leader will ensure that the trip is self-sufficient and has the necessary recovery gear and other items required to suit.
- **4.** Convoy members should identify themselves to the drivers of the vehicles directly in front and behind them when the convoy is established.
- 5. The Trip Leader will advise the convoy whenever they are to enter a new track or road.
- 6. It is the responsibility of all drivers to maintain visual contact with the following vehicle, especially at intersections by waiting at each turn until the following vehicle acknowledges the turn by flashing head lights or by UHF radio.
- 7. Each convoy shall contain a nominated Tail End Charlie.
- 8. The Tail End Charlie will advise the Trip Leader whenever they enter a new track or road.
- 9. When there is a breakdown, Tail End Charlie will wait and organise assistance.
- **10.** Drivers must leave a safe distance between vehicles, particularly in hilly country, if brakes are wet after a water crossing or after negotiating difficult terrain.
- **11.** When travelling along busy thoroughfares, leave sufficient room for other vehicles to overtake safely.
- **12.** In hazardous areas it is the responsibility of the following driver to ensure the previous vehicle has passed through the hazard before proceeding.
- **13.** In the interest of conservation, convoy members are to remain on gazetted or marked tracks.
- **14.** Persons leaving the convoy must notify the Trip Leader and, if possible, give details of their intentions.
- **15.** On trips with two or more vehicles, each vehicle will remain in a designated position in the convoy and not overtake the vehicle in front, unless the driver of that vehicle slows down and signals the overtaking vehicle to pass.
- **16.** When any form of recovery is in progress, all those not directly involved in the rescue operations must keep well clear and at a safe distance. Parents are particularly asked to keep their children at a safe distance.
- 17. The consumption of alcohol on club trips should be confined to the lunch break, and then only in moderation. Consumption of alcohol whilst driving should be avoided.
- 18. The use of radio transmitters does not replace convoy procedure.


How do I get the Sat Phone?
